# 2011 Woman of the Year Sara Rusch, MD, MACP



The Chancellor's Committee on the Status of Women has selected Sara Rusch, MD, MACP as the 2011 Woman of the Year. Dr. Rusch was nominated by Dr. Meenakshy Aiyer, the Interim Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine, with supporting nominations from Dr. Graumlich, Dr. de Alarcon, and Dr. Halvorsen.

"Dr. Sara Rusch is a role model who has had a great impact on her colleagues and students." -Meenakshy Aiyer Dr. Rusch is the Regional Dean at the University of Illinois College of Medicine at Peoria and a Professor of Clinical Medicine there. In addition, she is on staff at OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria, IL.

Dr. Rusch has dedicated her entire academic career to working at the U of I College of Medicine at Peoria. She has held multiple clinical and administrative roles, including Residency Program Director for Internal Medicine, Chair of the Department of Medicine at the College of Medicine's Regional Campus in Peoria and is the first woman to hold a Regional Dean position in the history of the College of Medicine.

Dr. Rusch is also recognized regionally and nationally for her contributions to her professional society, the American College of Physicians (ACP). She has served as Governor of the Downstate Illinois Chapter of the ACP, and in 2010 was elected to the prestigious ACP Mastership. Masters are a select group of highly distinguished physicians who have achieved excellence in medicine and have contributed significantly to medical science and the art of medicine. Throughout her work with the ACP she has been an advocate for the role of women and has served on the ACP Ad-hoc Committee on Women in Medicine. She also played an important role in the ACP Resolution 23 Committee that addressed the relationship between the state chapters and the national ACP organization.

Within UIC, she served as a member of the Faculty Academic Advancement Committee, a committee that seeks to make the College of Medicine a destination for talented and diverse faculty. The Association of American Medical Colleges awarded this committee the "Women in Medicine Leadership Development" Award in 2006. She was one of the leading committee members responsible for the development and implementation of the Integrated Medicine Psychiatric Clinic (IMPC).

She was instrumental in achieving the committee's goal of providing comprehensive continuous patient centered care to persons with serious mental illness. Her contributions to the development of mental health and drug abuse services in Peoria earned her the prestigious Arthur G. Greenberg Award. Recognizing her commitment to excellence in medical care, education and service to the community she was also awarded the ACP Illinois Laureate Award. (Continued on page 2)

Dr. Rusch has also served as an active member of the Society for Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine, a nonprofit organization committed to advancing and promoting women to executive positions in academic medicine and dentistry. Dr. Rusch has been a mentor and strong advocate for women on campus. As Chair of Internal Medicine, she created "Ladies Night Out", an informal gathering of women in the UICOMP Medicine Department that gathered together to discuss issues affecting their careers.

Dr. Rusch mentored many of these women and has successfully encouraged and enabled their professional and academic development, many of whom now serve in key faculty and administrative roles at the Peoria campus of the College of Medicine. Dr. Rusch's activities also include service on the following: UIC College of Medicine Executive Committee (1993-present), UIC AAMC Women's Liaison Officer (1996-present), Faculty Academic Advancement Committee at UIC (2003-present).

Leading by example, she has also been able to serve as a role model to people who wish to balance a successful professional career with the demands of life as a dedicated spouse and involved parent as she is the mother of seven children and six grandchildren.

## Faces of CCSW October: Tyra Oliver

Tyra Oliver has worked as a Licensed Clinical Social Worker at the Center for Women's Health in the University of Illinois Medical Center for the past three of her seven years at UIC. In this position, she assists women with resources and provides brief counseling. She also works closely with the medical team to ensure patients' needs are met.

Tyra first became involved in CCSW three years ago when she was looking for a way to network and learn more about resources offered at UIC. After checking out the CCSW website, she attended a meeting and quickly felt the group was a good fit. She increased her involvement in CCSW by becoming co-chair of the Minority Women's Concerns subcommittee. She saw this role as a way to lend her skills as a social worker and engage her passion to work with women.

Since becoming involved in CCSW, Tyra has enjoyed numerous opportunities to network with other professional women from diverse backgrounds and disciplines. "It is definitely one way that I feel connected

with UIC." Tyra encourages others to become involved in CCSW to experience similar benefits. "If they are able to get involved and understand the mission of CCSW, they will feel comfortable in knowing that this committee works very hard on women's issues and advocates for needed services, resources, etc."



(Continued from page 4) Summary: County is the story of one of America's oldest and most unusual urban hospitals. From its inception as a "Poor House" dispensing free medical care to indigents, Chicago's Cook County Hospital has been both a renowned teaching hospital and the healthcare provider of last resort for the city's uninsured. County covers more than thirty years of its history, beginning in the late 1970s when the author began his internship, to the "Final Rounds" when the enormous iconic Victorian hospital building was replaced and hundreds of former trainees gathered to bid it an emotional farewell. Ansell writes of the hundreds of doctors who went through the rigorous training process with him, sharing his vision of saving the world and of resurrecting a hospital on the verge of closing. County is about people, from Ansell's mentors, including the legendary Quentin Young, to the multitude of patients whom he and County's medical staff labored to diagnose and heal. It is a story about politics, from contentious union strikes to battles against "patient dumping," and public health, depicting the AIDS crisis and the opening of County's HIV/AIDS clinic, the first in the city. Finally, it is about a young man's medical education in urban America, a coming-of-age story set against a backdrop of race, segregation and poverty.

Summary: In Being Wrong, journalist Kathryn Schulz explores why we find it so gratifying to be right and so maddening to be mistaken, and how this attitude toward error corrodes relationships -- whether between family members, colleagues, neighbors, or nations. Along the way, she takes us on a fascinating tour of human fallibility, from wrongful convictions to no-fault divorce; medical


mistakes to misadventures at sea; failed prophecies to false memories; "I told you so!" to "Mistakes were made." Drawing on thinkers as varied as Augustine, Darwin, Freud, Gertrude Stein, Alan Greenspan, and Groucho Marx, she proposes a new way of looking at wrongness. In this view, error is both a given and a gif -- one that can transform our worldviews, our relationships, and, most profoundly, ourselves. Being Wrong is not just an account of human error but a tribute to human creativity -- the way we generate and revise our beliefs about ourselves and the world.

### Faculty Concerns - Review of Non-Tenure Track Faculty

The main item of business at the Faculty Concerns' September 23, 2011, meeting was Sharon Telleen's review of data on non-tenure track faculty. There are proportionately more female non-tenure track faculty with appointments over 50% than female tenure track faculty. We discussed the need for career ladders and clear job definitions and promotion criteria for non-tenure track faculty.

We are asking that all institutional research surveys and related information be kept in one accessible location, perhaps the office of institutional research.
